Disaster Response

Throughout 2021, we witnessed the residual affects of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic coupled with other challenges for our neighbor's experiencing crisis. In February 2021, Winter Storm Uri, a major winter storm event, hit Texas with wind, snow, and ice, leaving nearly 70 percent of Texans without power. Even after the storm was over, roughly 49 percent of household were left without access to water due to infrastructure and pipe freezes. The economic toll reported by the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas estimated financial losses between \$80 billion and \$130 billion. Once the roads were clear, the CAC team along with the efforts of local and county officials came together to provide immediate assistance with food and water for over 250 families. Over the course of the next few months after Uri, CAC worked alongside individuals and families on the road to recovery.

However difficult the challenge, CAC remained steadfast in providing the resources and services necessary for our neighbors to regain stability. While we have not seen the end to COVID-19, we have made significant progress to the new normal. To date, CAC has provided 17,650 services to 10,200 of neighbors experiencing the effects of the pandemic. When disaster strikes, CAC is ready to assist our neighbors in their time of need, serving as that light in the dark and the foundation for hope.





FUTURE PROGRESS

The one thing in life that remains consistent is change, and in 2022, CAC was able to put words into action with the expansion of services to reach communities with unmet needs. With the help of Precinct One County Commissioner's office, CAC expanded direct client service and case management in the Willis area. Through the partnership with the County, the North County Community Center houses a CAC case manager three days a week, eliminating barriers for clients in the northern part of the county. Furthermore, thanks to Commissioner Robert Walker, CAC also provides a miniature client choice food pantry to area residents, complete with shelf stable products as well as produce, dairy, and frozen foods as part of the client selection. The thought process behind such outreach is to meet our neighbors where they are to provide the services they need. We continue to change and adapt to provide the groundwork for our neighbors, and as we move forward with progress, we ask you to join us on this journey for a better community.

PROGRAMS & SERVICES



12,622 Neighbors were provided food assistance by CAC in 2021.

1,090,860 pounds of food was distributed throughout the year.

Client Choice Food Pantry

The Community Assistance Center Client Choice Food Pantry is a critical part of our efforts to end food insecurity in our community. Through the client choice model, our pantry resembles a small grocery market where our neighbors can select products based on their specific family needs. Fresh produce, a variety of proteins, and shelf stable selections are available at no cost to those in need. Baby care, personal hygiene items, and cleaning products are also distributed when available. Not only does this model allow clients the opportunity to choose their own food to fit their personal preference and special dietary needs,it give our clients a sense of dignity and respect while also limiting food waste.



Community Education

Community Assistance Center works to empower our clients with knowledge and skills that will move them towards the goal of self-sufficiency. CAC offers many opportunities to grow and learn including counseling, financial literacy, life skills, nutrition education, Senior Lunch & Learn sessions, and job skills.



Basic Needs & Crisis Intervention

CAC provides a variety of Services to Montgomery County residents when our help is needed most. We assist our neighbors with mortgage/rental assistance, emergency shelter vouchers, utility assistance, food and clothing, homeless care kits, transportation vouchers, and prescription assistance along with information and referral services.



Permanent Supportive Housing

A proven solution to homelessness for the most vulnerable and chronically homeless is Permanent Supportive Housing, or PSH. This program pairs afforable housing assistance, case management, and supportive services to promote independent living and tenancy skills while connecting people with community based health care, treatment, and supportive services. PSH has been shown to improve health and well-being while also providing a cost-effective solution to lower public costs associated with the use of crisis services such as shelters, hospitals, jails, and prisons.





Disaster Relief and Recovery

CAC provides assistance to those affected by disasters such as hurricanes, flooding, individual house fire, etc. CAC offers basic needs assistance as well as long-term recovery solutions and support.

Special Programs

CAC responds and adapts to community needs, providing a wide variety of special programs.

- Drive-thru Mobile Markets: Partnering with the Montgomery County Food Bank, CAC provides quarterly food distributions drive-thru style with volunteers and staff loading family vehicles with boxes of shelf stable foods, produce, meats, and dairy.
- Summer Stock: During the summer, CAC provides weekly bags of kid friendly groceries for our littlest neighbors. The program serves children who typically benefit from free or reduced meal programs during the school year.
- Back to School: Before school starts, CAC provides backpacks, school supplies and hygiene kits for teens along with new and gently used clothing and shoes through CAC's Unique Resale.
- Bags of Blessings & Cozy Christmas: For the holidays, CAC provides individuals and families with bags of holiday groceries. In December, families recieve a Cozy Christmas gift bag that include cozy items such as blankets, hot cocoa and family friendly games.

Hand-Up Initiative

CAC and our Collaboration Council is dedicated to breaking the cycle of poverty. We employ a holistic approach for those clients who express an interest in proactively taking the necessary steps towards self-sufficiency by providing support and the most comprehensive resources available to our neighbors in need. This initiative enables our clients to develop a greater understanding of accountability so that they are proactive in working towards long-term solutions.

The purpose of the Hand Up Initiative is to identify, encourage, and empower clients to gain greater levels of financial independence and self-sufficiency. Clients motivated to make positive changes engage in a comprehensive, client-centered plan while also receiving coordinated case management. The Hand Up Initiative provides enhanced intake assessments, individualized service plans and expanded service delivery through an outcomes-driven collaboration of community service providers.

This volunteer led ministry assists individuals needing to acquire an official state identification, birth certificate, or social security card. Proof of identification is necessary to obtain a job, shelter, collect benefits, and even just to stay out of trouble for failure to provide. For clients who experience homlessness, incarceration, aging out of foster care, or those fleeing domestic violence, obtaining identification is crucial to moving forward.

Meet MIGUEL


Miguel was the youngest of five children and lost his mother at a very young age. His father, a military man, had moved the family around the country during his years in the service, eventually settling the family in Los Angeles. Miguel remembers California being a beautiful place, but over the years LA grew to be less and less safe. He remembers how his older brother "lived the life" as a gang member on the low rider scene. It was in early 2000s that the gang violence around him would impact his life forever. While visiting a friend's house, just down the street from his home, Miguel was shot in a drive by shooting, leaving him lucky to be alive. After multiple surgeries to remove the shrapnel, Miguel returned home to care for his ailing father.

After his father passed in 2011, there was nothing left in LA for Miguel, so he came to Texas after his cousin encouraged him to leave. Not long after his move, Miguel found it easier to be on the streets than with family due to their own struggles. Due to his injuries, Miguel has a hard time remembering how long he lived on the streets, but he made friends in the camps and learned how to be part of a community again. In 2021, Miguel stayed at a shelter in Conroe and learned about Community Assistance Center.



"I would come to CAC for food and clothing," said Miguel, "and when new people came to the shelter, I would take them with me to get help from CAC." It was at Community Assistance Center that Miguel connected with Michelle, who is a services coordinator, from Star of Hope and partner agency of CAC. Michelle helped Miguel navigate the various services for unhoused persons and helped him receive the disability documentation he needed for CAC's Permanent Supportive Housing program.

By the end of 2021, Miguel was off the streets and in a place of his own. Julio Bandilla, CAC's Director of Programs and Client Services, served as Miguel's Case Manager when he joined the Permanent Supportive Housing program. "Julio has helped me quite a bit. He helped me in finding housing, transportation to appointments, groceries, everything, "said Miguel. CAC's resale shop has helped furnish Miguel's home and he is immensely proud to share with others how CAC has changed his life. "I don't think anyone wakes up wanting to be out of sorts. If you have issues, there is help. It's all here locally."

The Legacy Luncheon returned in 2021 to welcome keynote speaker Liz Murray, the Co-Founder & Executive Director of The Arthur Project and the inspiration behind the Lifetime movie, Homeless to Harvard. The event took place on May 14, 2021 at The Woodlands Waterway Marriott with over 450 guests in attendance.

Liz Murray's life is a story of triumph over adversity and an example of the importance of dreaming big. Murray was raised in the Bronx by two loving but drug-addicted parents. She grew up in poverty, often without enough food, chronically absent from school and most of all, struggling to connect her education to a viable future. By age 15, Murray's mom had died and she was homeless-living on the streets, riding the subway all night, and eating from dumpsters. Amidst this pain, Murray always imagined her life could be much better than it was. Determined to take charge of her life, and with the support of an upstairs neighbor and trusted family friend named Arthur, Murray finished high school in just two years and was awarded a full scholarship to Harvard University, all while camping out in New York City parks and subway stations.

These days, Murray devotes her time to serving as an advocate for underserved youth. Murray graduated from Harvard in 2009 and received her master's degree in Education Psychology at Columbia University. She is passionate about speaking on the importance of personal motivation, transforming problems into opportunities, and what it takes to make a difference in





The Legacy Luncheon also serves as an opportunity for Community Assistance Center (CAC) to recognize local community members who have served as champions for CAC and have made significant contributions to Montgomery County neighbors in need. 




